APRIL 4, SUNDAY 10:30 am 27 and 42
mile loops

Starting point: South Natick Dam (Route 16 and Pleasant Street). Please park on Pleasant Street.

May (Bike Month)

MAY 2 10:30 am 10 and 25 mile loops"Start of Bike Month Activities"

Starting point: Hayden Recreation Center, 24 Lincoln Street, Lexington.

Bike month's first ride includes 10 and 25 mile rides through Lexington, Weston, Waltham, and Lincoln. People who have never ridden with the CRW before are encouraged to come. MAY 16, SUNDAY 10:30 am 20 and 40
mile loops

Starting point: Newton Centre, at the intersection of Beacon and Centre Streets.

This weeks ride will follow a south-westerly route from Newton heading out to Medfield. Information on lunch and ride leaders will be provided in next month's Wheelpeople.

MAY 23, SUNDAY 9:00 am 25 and 50
mile loops

"CRW Spring Celebration"

Starting point: Dedham Plaza (located on Route 1, one mile north of the intersection with Route 128).

Come ride CRW's annual spring (LAW sanctioned) quarter and half-century ride. Fee of \$2 for CRW members, \$3 for non-members, will cover patch (if 25 miles is completed in 3 hours, or 50 miles completed in 6 hours), sag-wagon, map, marking of route, and refreshments. Commemorative Bike Month patches will be available to purchase.

MAY 29-31 MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND 340 miles
"Sixth Annual Tour of New England"

This trip touches all six New England states in three days and goes through some of the most beautiful scenery in the area. The ride leader is Jacek "Rudy" Rudowski, 625-0610, (evenings).

Saturday, the group of riders choosing to participate, will leave Boston before sunrise. Lights are required, though this probably will be the only night riding the group will do. The group will head towards Rhode Island, riding through the northwestern corner of Connecticut, then will cross Massachusetts to the southwestern corner of New Hampshire. The group will cover about 146 miles the first day and spend the night in Brattleboro, Vermont at the Suisse Chalet.

The second day the group will ride 119 miles across New Hampshire. The roads are quite hilly all the way across. The group will spend Sunday night at the Ramada Inn in Dover, New Hampshire.

Monday the group will ride into Maine and back to Boston covering about 75 miles. The trip is a total of 340 miles of little traffic and/or wide shoulders. You should not come on this trip unless you have 100 plus mile per day capability on VERY DIFFICULT TERRAIN for a two day back-to-back ride. There is no sag wagon. If you feel during the trip that you can't handle the "10 miles per hour including stops pace", you are never more than 100 miles from Boston.

The ride leaves May 29th, rine or shine. Rudy will want the group to keep together because each day involves some back roads that he is not familiar enough with to explain beforehand, though he knows his way along them. This will depend on the size and capabilities of the group. Most of the riding is on numbered routes. If the group is too large to keep together Rudy will designate places where riders will regroup so everyone can follow him over the back roads. There is one segment of back roads each day, besides leaving and entering the Boston area at the beginning and end of the trip. If enough people come on the trip Rudy will go out by car and mark the turns on the back roads with arrows painted on the pavement. Cue sheets will be provided. Rudy recommends you bring a New England map. The Exxon New England map is excellent.

The fee is \$53.00 due April 15th and covers most of the motel costs. This fee is non-refundable. All the other costs along the way come out of your own pocket. Fees should be sent to: Jacek "Rudy" Rudowski, 7 Farragut Avenue, Somerville, MA 02144. Include your name and phone number, and a SASE with your fee. Rudy will send you lodging information if you indicate you require it. He will contact you in May on where to meet and the exact starting time.

"The Century of the Century"

This ride, sponsored by the Narragansett Bay Wheelmen, starts at the University of Rhode Island Athletic Parking Lot, Route 138, Kingston, RI. The ride is a real challenge, with many of the hills at the end. The \$2 fee includes patch, map, marked route, and limited sag wagon.

"GEAR-Up 82"

JUNE 20, SUNDAY 3 am East Providence, RI

"The Drummond Double Century"

This 200 mile ride, sponsored by the Narragansett Bay Wheelmen, starts at the Wampanoag Mall at the jct of Routes 44 and

114, East Providence, RI. The ride is as flat as "The Flattest Century in the East". The fee is approximately \$8 and includes patch, map, marked route, and full sag wagon service with refreshments. LIGHTS ARE REQUIRED AND RIDERS MUST HAVE COMPLETED ONE CENTURY.

JULY 3-5 July 4th Weekend

"Seventh Annual Trip to Mount Washington"

This trip is from Boston to the summit of Mount Washington, New Hampshire and back in three days. Jacek "Rudy" Rudowski, 625-0610, is the ride leader for this excursion.

Saturday the group choosing to go, will assemble and leave Boston before sunrise, and arrive at Pinkham Notch after sunset. LIGHTS ARE REQUIRED. In Pinkham Notch there is an Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC) hut where the group will spend both nights.

Sunday, three miles from the AMC hut is the start of the eight mile long Mount Washington Auto Road. The average grade is 12% with the steepest being 26%. Rudy doesn't recommend trying to climb Mount Washington for the first time with anything higher than a 30 inch gear. If you decide not to ride up the mountain, you can hike the four miles to the summit from the AMC hut.

Monday the group rides back to Boston. Rudy leaves on this ride July 3rd, rain or shine. He will try to keep the group together.

Usually it takes 17 hours, including stops, to cover the 150 miles between Boston and the summit or Pinkham Notch. The fee is \$12, due April 30th. This is nonrefundable. It covers reserving rooms at the AMC hut. Total costs for the two night's accommodations, a breakfast, and a supper is approximately \$39. Rudy takes no responsibility if the weather is bad and the group cannot make the climb. Last year is the only time that happened. It usually is lousy weather at the top of the mountain (360 days/year).

Rudy knows of two people who had Suntour Pro Compe freewheels break on the Mount Washington Auto Road. If you plan to use a Pro Compe freewheel or one of its variations, convert it to a Pro Compe tandem freewheel. There is no sag wagon. Rudy will contact you in June on where to meet and the exact starting time.

JULY 3-5 July 4 Weekend

"Second Annual July 4th Trip to Cape Cod"

This excursion leaves Boston 6 pm Friday, returning Monday 6 pm. Lodging is at hostels (low cost, bunkhouse accommodations, hot showers, cooking facilities, plenty camaraderie). The route includes the Bridgewater Train Hostel, New Bedford, Martha's Vineyard, Hyannis, Orleans, Provincetown, and Boston. Due to the excellent ferry connections, only 40 miles of riding per day are necessary -- ride more if you wish. There will be time for swimming and siteseeing. A lot of you may question the 500,000 mile goal for 1982. So to make you believers I put the calculator to work and came up with the following.

We now have approximately 450 members in the club. 500,000 miles equals to an average of 1,111 miles each. But last year the top 5 did 66,611 miles so they took care of 60 people all by themselves. Similarly the top 10 did 105,235, enough for 95. The 82 people who reported in 1981 did 301,051, which accomodates 271 people at 1,111 apiece. So . . . if the 82 riders just hold their own, that says the remaining 368 only have to do 198,949

or an average of 540 each. See how easy it is going to be?!!

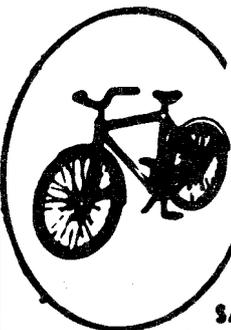

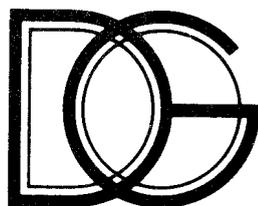

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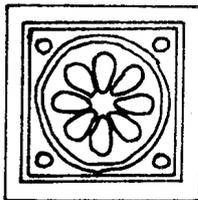


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
