April 3 agenda items and actions summary:

Awards Banquet: As of April 3, only 30 have signed up.

CRW Membership List: The club policy of not releasing the list under any circumstances was re-stated.

Pro-Rating of Dues: To ensure that LAW and CRW memberships coincide, under specific circumstances membership periods of less than one year will be accepted at .80/month.

CRW Description: Ed Trumbell has rewritten the Wheelpeople club manifesto; it will be submitted to the editor.

Bike Month Activities: A flier/CRW application form is being typeset and printed thanks to Karen Lease; volunteers will distribute and post.

Exit Polls: Debby Allinger, Jim Broughton, Jerry Campbell, Mike Hanauer, Karen Lease and Ed Trumbell have agreed to call a few nonrenewing members on a rotating basis. The survey will begin in May. More volunteers are encouraged.

CRW Invitational: We are still looking for venues in the Concord area to hold this Aug. 5 event. The ideal spot will have picnic, parking, and restroom facilities.

GEAR-UP: For those interested, there is a train that goes to Baltimore. Call Amtrak.



The Charles River Wheelmen is a group of active adult bicyclists who sponsor a yearround program to promote the enjoyment of bicycling. July 7-9



Dear Editor, Wheel People

REPLY TO: March 28, 1984

I am writing to correct some misinformation contained the Anita Brewer's letter published in the March issue of Wheel People.

- 1. The letter said the League's legislative program has been cut. Not true. The 1984 budget approved unanimously by the Board of Directors calls for spending \$3,000 more on the legislative program than was spent in 1983. We have hired a professional to coordinate government relations, replacing Ralph Hirsch, contracted consultant who resigned effective January 31, 1984. Our government relations program will operate out of our Baltimore office, saving the \$550 a month rent Hirsch's 3-room office suite in Philadelphia was costing us. Consolidating our operations will also provide/secretarial and administrative support to our legislative activities for the first time. The legislative program has been strengthened, not cut.
- 2. The letter said the name of the League has been changed. Not true. The Board made a commitment to retain League of American Wheelmen as the legal name, to preserve our history and tradition. BICYCLE USA is being used as the name of our monthly magazine and as our tradename to help us recruit new members so that our resources will grow enough to allow us to improve the services and programs our members want.
- 3. The letter said that 8 of 15 Board positions are open. Not true. Three Board members resigned (two had to because they moved out of their regions), one in November, another in December and the third effective February 6th. Following a Board vote that supported the authority of the President to make appointments to fill vacancies, replacements were named to serve until the next election (see page 2 of the March BICYCLE USA magazine). They will have an opportunity to stand for reelection in the next election, the nominating process for which begins this July immediately following the Annual Meeting. The other five positions are not open. They are currently filled by incumbents who will continue to serve until winners of the ongoing election take office at the Board meeting this July.
- 4. The letter said it is not clear how new revenue derived from membership growth will be spent. All items of projected revenue and expense are detailed in the 1984 budget which was approved by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors at their meeting in December 1983. Your current Regional Vice President, Ed Gross, who is also a member of The Charles River Wheelmen, has had a copy of the League's 1984 budget since before the December meeting. Copies of the budget are available to any League member upon request from the office. I will gladly answer any questions you have concerning the League's budget.

The support and participation of the Charles River Wheelmen in the League is greatly appreciated. The League's programs are growing in spite of the misinformation that is being circulated.

LEAGUE OF AMERICAN WHEELMEN

Anita Brewer replies:

I stand behind what I wrote in March, and to be completely certain, I've rechecked my sources.

Legislative program: yes, the salary of the new coordinator is \$3000 more than Ralph Hirsch was paid, but according to the FY84 budget sheets, the program as a whole drops from \$57,000 to \$22,000--stated to be a \$21,872 decrease from actual '83 expenditure. "Strengthened" to some may mean "diminished" to others.

Name change: yes, LAW is the legal name, but what counts is the visible, public name of the group: BICYCLE USA.

Board positions: here our differences seem to be semantics. To me, an "open" position is one that has been vacated by resignation, or a position slated for routine election. Three resignations plus five elections add up to eight openings, and this total is important considering the size of the board (15).

Future revenues: yes, I have the budget in front of me, but neither it nor the marketing plan states how the bigger budget and membership rolls will affect the League.

Finally, if Mr. Leiby knew how the CRW feels about its treatment by the LAW in recent months, I don't think he could end by affirming the LAW's conduct.

So you see, there are some nice folks out there and this gentleman is certainly one of them


