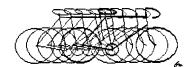

EDITORIAL

Congratulations are in order this month for Charles Hyde-Wright, Doug Mink and the other officers and members of the Boston Area Bicycle Coaliation, the Charles River Wheelmen, and other bicycle clubs and organizations who spearheaded the recent successful "Bikes-onthe-T" campaign in metropolitan Boston.

Praise is also due to the State legislators and T officials who have supported "Bikes-on-the T". As a result of their combined efforts, bicyclists are able as of June 1, 1986 to use the Red, Orange, and Blue rapid transit lines of the MBTA on Sundays and certain holidays on a regular basis.

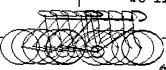
The six-month trial period in 1985 proved to both the T and bicycle riders that rapid transit accessibility is vital to the use of bicycles in and around Boston. "Bikes-on-the-T" is a most important development in the history of Boston-area bicycling, and puts Boston on a par with Washington, Toronto and other "rapid transit" cities which properly extend such travel privileges to bicyclists.

CRW members and other cyclists now have some new, exciting, and long overdue travel options. We also have an unparalleled opportunity to demonstrate to the T-riding public that cyclists are in fact adult and responsible persons. By our conduct and appearance while riding T trains as cyclists, we can impress upon passengers and T staff that we are greatly concerned for safety and courtesy as bike riders; that we obey traffic laws and encourage others to do so; and that, most importantly, bicycling is now a better-than-ever alternative to driving around the metro area.

WHEELPEOPLE encourages its readers to take an active role in developing good public relations for bicycling—talk to fellow T passengers and to T staff about bicycling, encourage them to try biking themselves, and stress the importance of wearing helmets and using ather safety equipment when cycling.

Buy and use a T-pass---

WHAT YOUR BOARD DID IN JUNE

June 3 agenda item & actions summary

INCORPORATION: Dave Brahmer circulated Mass. Annual Report forms for all board members to sign. These will be submitted to the state to bring our status up to date.

MASSACHUSETTS BICYCLE ADVISORY BOARD: John Allen distributed a draft statement expressing policy concerns, especially that funds are going to non-biking activities. John is looking for input and comments, please contact him at 891-9307.

PALM CHALLENGE: Anita Brewer addressed the board, noting that this ride (Pedal Across Lower Michigan) is a worthwhile fund raising event for the Bicycle USA legislative program. A \$5000 goal has been established, over 35 clubs have already donated (last month, CRW voted \$100). Anita is our regional board member to Bicycle USA.

NEW ENGLAND AREA RALLY: Anita noted that NEAR will be held the last weekend of July 1987 in Durham at U. of NH, two weeks after GEAR in Long Island.

CRW BOARD MEETINGS: An alternate location is needed for August and September. Dave Hill will check into Draper Labs. If you have a possibility, please contact any board member.

SUMMER BARBECUE: Will not be held this year; the board felt that the Twentieth Anniversary Festival will suffice.

NUTRITION: Cutler West noted a concern over diet, especially excess sugar, at club activities. If you share this concern, please contact Cutler. (Ice cream freaks can ignore this item.)

MEMBERSHIP LIST: Dick Lewis noted that an area bike shop has requested our roster. In accordance with policy, the request was denied.

PRESIDENTIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS: Dave Brahmer has created a notebook of official club documents. Also, he is entertaining a possible job offer which may drastically curtail his CRW activities.

SECRETARIAL ANNOUNCEMENT: Mike Hanauer wishes to relinquish this position after a 3 year stint. Please contact Mike at 862-5927 if you are interested. Please.

SPRING CENTURY: Dave Hill reported that 160 people did one of the four rides, netting CRW \$407. In addition, a number of T-shirts and water bottles were sold. Our thanks to all who helped, especially to Debby Allinger who did an outstanding job in coordinating the May 18 event.

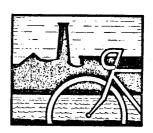

Knapsack Tours

Friday evenings, July-August 6:00 p.m. LOWELL HISTORICAL PARK Bring your own bike and picnic snack for an evening exploration of little-known by-ways to discover canals and rivers, mills and mansions, and neighborhoods of the industrial city. Reservations must be made, call the Park Visitor Center at 459-1000.

July 11 - Meet in front of the Wannalancit Office and Technology Center on Suffolk St. for a biking tour of the Northern Canal

July 18 and August 29 -- Conquer the Concord. A tour from the mouth of the Concord River at the Merrimack past important mill sites, lower locks on the Pawtucket Canal, and forgotten canals and mills on the River Meadow Brook. Many stops for interpretation.

July 25 -- "The Kerouac Beat" The rhythm and ambience of Lowell pulse through the novels of native son Jack Kerouac. This bike tour visits the author's birthplace, the houses he lived in, and the school, church, mills and streets he wrote about. A look at the future site of the Kerouac Memorial also.

August 1 -- "The Miles of Mills on the Merrimack". A tour along the canal-side fronts of the mills, over the Bridge St. Bridge, and down the riverside trail with the best view of the "mile of mills"

August 8 -- Follow the Falls; the Pawtucket Dam Expedition. A tour from Guard Locks and one side of the Dam to the other, up along the river trail with superb views of the dam, Pawtucket Canal, and the mill pond, created by Lowell's founders. Final stop at the state-of-the-art hydroelectric project will be amazing.

August 15 -- "Mills to Mansions; The Rags to Riches Story" Atour by major mills, early corporate housing for workers and managers, and later mansions built for the industrialists.

The Charles River Wheelmen is a group of active adult bicyclists who sponsor a year-round program to promote enjoyment of bicycling. During regular season (early Spring to late Fall), two ride loops are usually available every Sunday, designed to be ridden at your own pace. The routes are arrowed in advance and the leaders stay in the rear to ensure that nobody gets left behind. Our Winter Frostbite rides are more informal; the route and pace are decided by those who show up to brave the elements.

Singing Beach Ride

July 6

9:00 & 10:15 AM

<u>Highlights</u>: Beautiful country back roads of Essex County on Cape Ann, followed by a stop at Singing Beach in Manchester with the express purpose of spending time there – don't forget your bathing suit! This beautiful beach, known for its view and its fine sand, is inconvenient to motorists due to limited parking, but convenient for bicyclists because the road dead ends right at the beach within 50 yards of the ocean.

- 1) Long ride (<u>55 miles</u>): starts at <u>9:00 AM</u> at Wakefield center, next to the bandstand, at the intersection of Main St. (Rt. 129) and Church St., by Lake Quannapowitt, and meets the short ride at it's start in Hamilton.
- 2) Short ride (25 miles): starts at 10:15 AM at the Hamilton Shopping Center, at the intersection of Rt. 1A (Bay Rd.) and Walnut St. in South Hamilton. *Driving directions* from Rt. 128 exit 20N. go north on Rt. 1A for 3 miles to the Hamilton Shopping Center on your right.

This very moderate *terrain* ride, which was less than the success it should have been last year due to heavy rain, is being lead this year by Jack Donohue and Susan Grieb (324-3926) and Sue Genser (782-4121). Think sunshine!

<u>Highlights</u>: A repeat of last years quadruple route ride, over rolling country backroads with little traffic.

Start: Weston Center at the Common, at the intersection of Boston Post Road and Townhouse Road, in Weston.

9:30 AM: 40 & 50 miles, rolling terrain. 10:30 AM: 25 & 35 miles, rolling terrain.

Ride leaders are Osman Isvan (651-3186) & Jacek Rudowski (361-5273). Osman worked out the logistics so that both the short and long routes meet for *lunch* at Concord Green at approximately the same time. The short rides travel thru the towns of Wayland, Sudbury, Concord & Lincoln, while the long rides also include Acton, Carlisle, Bedford & Lexington.

July 21

9:00 & 10:00 AM

<u>Highlights</u>: Ice scream stop; lunch and swimming at Harold Parker State Forest (bring swim suit, lock and lunch) in North Reading for the long ride; lunch stop at Lake Quannapowitt for the short ride.

Start: Upper Mystic Lake swimming area parking lot, in Winchester, on the Mystic Valley Parkway.

9:00 AM: 55 miles maximum, easy terrain except for 2 big hills.

10:00 AM: 26 miles, easy terrain.

Leaders are Bruce Wisentaner (783-9258) and Tim Oey (762-1944). These are approximately the same very popular rides that Bruce has lead for the last 2 years. For the short route, lunch can be purchased near by in Wakefield Center, and there is a convenience store several miles before the long routes lunch stop.

Joint CRW/North Shore Cyclist Ride July 27 10:00 AM

Start: Great Road Shopping Center on routes 4 & 225 in Bedford, on the left about 2 miles west of route 128. **Not** to be confused with the Bedford (Marshall's) Shopping Center about another mile down the road. Park in section of lot farthest away from the big stores.

Jill and Dick Lewis (641–1066) together with North Shore Cyclist member Ken Simpson (352–6578) are our ride leaders. The ride distances are 32 miles and 48 miles, the terrain includes some hills, especially leading into Westford Center, and the lunch stop is at Littleton Green, where there is a Cumberland Farms and a pizza shop to buy food. Towns include Billerica, Chelmsford, Westford, Littleton, Carlisle (and Groton and Ayer for the long route).

Bikes on the T Here to Stay!

The MBTA Board of Directors voted in April for a permanent bicycle program. Every Sunday starting June 1, cyclists will be allowed on the Red, Orange, and Blue Lines. The MBTA will require that bicyclists display special permits which cost \$5 and are valid for two years. They are being sold on weekdays during business hours at the T's pass office on the concourse between Park and Washington St. stations. 1985 permits have been extended for one year, free of charge. (If you had a pass last year and have not yet received a sticker in the mail with the new expiration date, contact the MBTA.) Rules are the same as last year- up to two bicycles are allowed in the last car of the train only. Cyclists will not be allowed on the T between Thanksgiving and Christmas, but will be allowed on some holidays (not July 4 or Patriot's Day, however). This decision by the MBTA culminates a long campaign by the Boston Area Bicycle Coalition, with the help of more than a few CRW members. Many thanks to everyone who wrote letters, attended rallies, supported the demonstration program last year, and otherwise made it happen. It is now up to the bicyclists of Boston to use the program carefully so that the T can be convinced to expand the program to other off-peak hours, to commuter rail, and, maybe someday, to bike racks on the front of Green Line streetcars! Get a pass and use the T instead of your car to get to a ride that starts on the other side of the city.

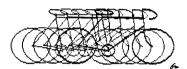

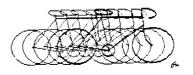
